

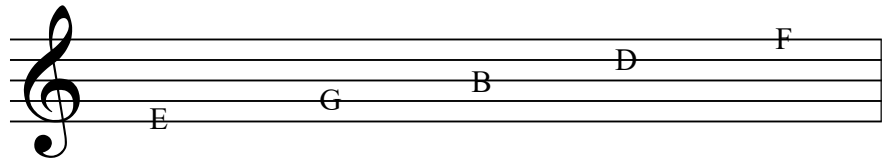
Treble Clef

A Clef is a symbol at the beginning of the staff that assigns letter names to the individual lines and spaces of the staff. A Treble Clef is pictured here:



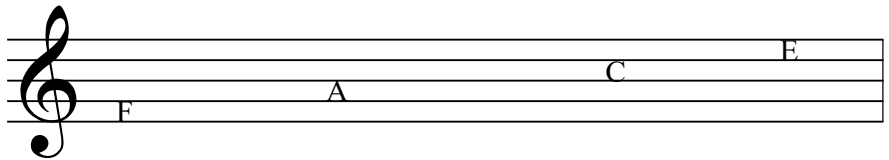
Treble clef indicates that notes will be in a higher pitch range. Notice how the treble clef looks a little like the letter G. In fact, this clef is also referred to as G Clef because the loop of the part that looks like the letter G goes around the 2nd line of the staff. If we had a note on this line, it would be called G.

If you see a treble clef in your music, your lines will be named as follows:



If you have a note that falls on one of these lines, it will be called the letter name of that line. A good way to remember the names of the lines is **E**lvis's **G**uitar **B**roke **D**own **F**riday.

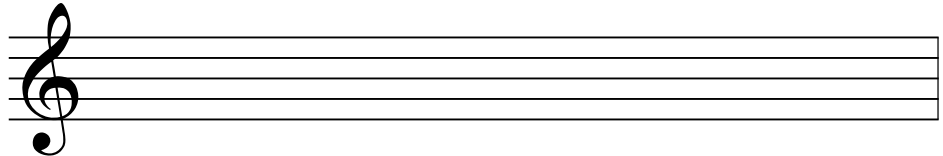
The spaces also have names in treble clef. The are:



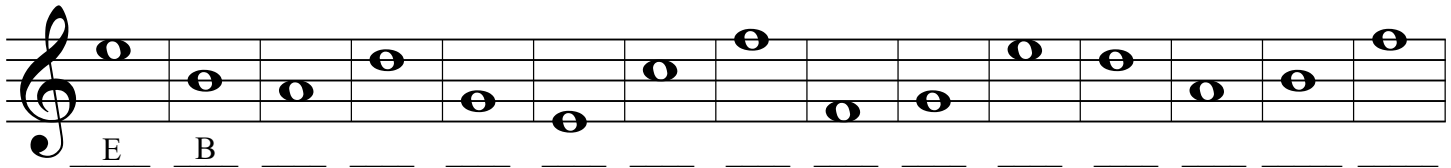
If you have a note that falls on one of these spaces, it will be called the letter name of that space. A good way to remember the names of the spaces is **F** **A** **C** **E**. Or the word **FACE**.
